WHAT'S ON

NATURE NOTES

have been struggling with "writer's block". Blank mind, unused pencil and an equally blank computer screen. Various ideas have come and gone without so much as a whisper of enthusiasm. I was thinking too narrowly. I needed to broaden my outlook. Nature is world-wide.

Being a farmer's daughter, I grew up surrounded by animals - Jersey cows, Suffolk x Border Leicester sheep and Large White pigs - but there were also the ones we grumbled about. The blind moles with vicious tiny white teeth and soft velvet grey fur warming a sausage body with pink paws and strong claws which should have belonged to a much bigger creature. Minding its own business, busily diaaina tunnels underground, a mole would cause my Father "a furry fury" when he found heaped mounds of soil in the pasture or on the lawn.

Rabbits provoked a similar tantrum, when their burrows destroyed the hedgerows or they nibbled on newlyplanted trees or invaded the vegetable garden. As soon as they caught a whiff of a human, nose and ears would twitch and away they would scamper, white scut disappearing into the hedge, while we surveyed the evidence of their visit.

Rats were unspeakably unpleasant residents. Sly and bold with no endearing characteristics, they would eat anything and chew everything.

There were also the beautiful and welcome creatures, like the swallows, filling the air with their joyful twittering and graceful flight. We heard the hoot of hunting owls, while hedgehogs cleared the garden of slugs and snails. When they crept off to a cosy nest of dried grass and crisp, curling leaves in a corner of the woodshed, the dawn chorus began. The glorious wake-up call of blackbirds, thrushes, blue tits, robins, wrens, goldcrest, nuthatch, wood woodpecker, pigeon and sparrows waking the world with their warbling, whistling, chirping and chattering.

Like chubby-cheeked, grubby-kneed schoolboys, the sparrows hopscotched amongst the rustling leaves under the holly hedge. In the fairy's place on the old Christmas tree, a robin perched, red chest puffed out like a tenor as he poured forth another aria. The bullies – the raucous rooks and sharp-eyed magpies, would sneak to the bird table to steal breakfast, sending the little birds scattering in panic.

I moved from Warwickshire to Devon, with Exmoor and Dartmoor nearby, with the wild ponies, badgers, foxes, deer, bats and buzzards and the creatures of the rivers – otters, voles and kingfishers. We delighted in the wildlife of the hills and valleys, and the butterflies and birds which visited our garden.

Warwickshire to Devon was not so far, but from Devon to Borneo was a little different. Borneo – magical, mysterious, far-away island. Land of sunshine and rain, home to precious rainforest and an amazing diversity of wildlife and many different tribes people, all with their own traditions, culture and language.

I read of a tribe who were head-hunters, of ladies whose ears were stretched to their shoulders, of semi-naked people whose bodies were painted with black patterns and who roamed the forest. Animals that looked like orange-haired men, spiders as big as your hand and snakes so big they could eat a fullgrown man.

The reality was as amazing as the stories we had read. The first creatures we encountered were geckos. They live everywhere: in trees, rocky outcrops, rotting vegetation, the beach edge and in houses, hotels, shops, offices, huts, garden sheds and longhouses. Homes with geckos rarely suffer with mosquitoes, flies or spiders, so it is really a choice of which you prefer.

Geckos (or chit-chats) are small lizards that, depending on type, can range from 8.5 to 35 cms in length, including tail, when they are fully grown. They have splendid names such as the Smooth-backed Gliding Gecko, which has skin fringes to help it glide away from danger. There is also the Cardamom Slender-toed Gecko and the Wandering Round-eyed Gecko. For small are such creatures they extremely noisy-especially at night. Their startling cry of chit-chit-chat often wakens one from dreams-they are so loud they can be heard calling from neighbouring houses, so there is no point in trying to locate the offender and evict it.

Geckos have a remarkable ability to "lose" their tails if in danger of being

caught, or eaten. My husband picked his shorts off the dressing table where he had thrown them the previous evening. As he put them on, a gecko scrabbled down his leg, dropped to the ground and scuttled away to safetytail-less. Its tail was left, wriggling madly, caught up in the hairs on his leg. Everyone had horror stories about geckos: finding them in one's bed or undies drawer; falling from the ceiling and landing on your head, or in the dinner; standing on one accidentally with bare feet, or unpacking them along with the contents of a suitcase; taking off your boots and finding a squashed gecko in your crumpled socks. . . the list was endless.

I lay enjoying a soak in the bath when I felt something moving in my hair. I thought it was the shampoo bubbles popping, until a slight splash next to my shoulder made me turn my head. A small Flat-tailed Gecko was doing doggy paddle.

We checked the kettle every morning for the presence of wildlife. I was about to boil the kettle one morning when I heard a splashing sound. Upon investigation, I found a chit-chat swimming inside. I was lucky. A friend only realized a chit-chat had been swimming in her kettle when she emptied the last few drops of water and out fell a decomposing chit-chat which had opviously drowned there several days previously.

They are interesting little creatures. Depending on their type, their colours vary from pink and orange to black to mottled patterns or stripes of browns, greens and yellows. At night, when chit-chats do most of their hunting, they sit near the lights, darting out suddenly to catch unwary flies and insects. Their suckered toes and fingers allow them to walk vertically and upside down, even on glass. The eggs are tiny, off-white and appear in strange places. Sometimes, they have fallen and smashed on the floor with the little one inside. Ants rapidly move in to carry the feast away. Often, chitchats are squashed in door frames, and it is incredible to watch an army of industrious ants carrying the flattened, dead lizard up walls and across the ceiling to their nest.

Industrious Ants. There are 12,000 ant species worldwide. But perhaps I better save ant stories for another day. Fiona Bladon JULY

There's an old saying that only once in your life should you need a doctor, a lawyer, a policeman, and of course, a preacher on Sundays, but every day, three times a day, you need a farmer.

St Margaret's Church and churchyard The churchyard has recently undergone a big clear-up and harsh tree and hedge pruning over the past couple of months. Thank you, Reg and Don, for carrying out the major part of the work and thanks to everyone else who helped to clear the churchyard. Now the wild flowers are blooming and it looks stunning.
