



#### **NATURE NOTES**

#### **Mistletoe**

WWas mistletoe part of your Christmas? Did you pause to think what traditions might lie behind the appearance of its snow-white berries, evergreen leaves and romantic reputation over the festive period?

In Britain most mistletoe is found in the south and west Midlands, with particularly good populations in Herefordshire, Worcestershire, Gloucestershire, Gwent and Somerset. There is mistletoe elsewhere, but it is only regionally abundant in that core area of the south-west midlands. Whilst not abundant in and around Tiverton, there is some, one of the most obvious collections being in the large trees along Canal Hill not far from Withy Close and Devonshire Rise.

Change may be happening though – new evidence from the last 20 years suggests that mistletoe is spreading faster than it used to. This is particularly noticeable in eastern areas, where established but seemingly static mistletoe populations are now spreading. Is this change due to climate or to birds? It could be subtle hints of climate change – computer modelling does suggest that mistletoe will head east with climate change.

Or it could be something else? One possibility is better spread of the seeds by Blackcaps, a bird that is particularly efficient at spreading mistletoe. British Blackcaps migrate for the winter so they do not usually affect mistletoe here, but recently continental Blackcaps have started overwintering in Britain, with many thousands now spending their winters here and feeding on mistletoe and then spreading it.

The berries pass through a bird's digestive tract, to emerge little changed and very gloopy. If deposited on a branch, they readily stick to it establishing a new plant if the conditions are suitable. The mistletoe's roots tap into the tree, taking water and nutrients as it grows but, as rule, doing little or no harm to its host in the process. Apple trees, blackthorn and poplars are amongst its favourite hosts.

Kissing beneath the mistletoe is a very old tradition indeed and although part of Christmas revels, mistletoe is rarely allowed inside a church because of its strong pagan associations. It is well known as the most sacred plant of the Druids, the priestly clan of the Celts.

If you have a young fruit tree in your churchyard, garden or elsewhere, how about encouraging mistletoe by smearing some berries onto the bark after Christmas is over. The thin bark of a young trees is easier for the mistletoe to penetrate and establish.

## A REFLECTION FOR LENT BEGINNING ON SUNDAY 22 FEBRUARY 2026

2 Corinthians 5: 20b - 6: 10 '....having nothing, and yet possessing everything' (6.10)

During a long train journey with a friend who is a Muslim, the conversation turned to Ramadan, the month during which Muslims fast between sunrise and sunset. She patiently answered my questions, and the comment that struck me was: 'It is those who have least who value Ramadam most, because during the fast, rich people realize what it feels like to be poor.'

I am reminded of this by Paul's counter-cultural advertisement for the lifestyle that most effectively witnesses to the richness of the gospel of Jesus. It needs to include perseverance during all kinds of difficulty (6. 4,5), integrity in character and conversation (6.6-8), and contentment even during times of pain and deprivation (6.9,10). Ambassadors to Jesus most effectively demonstrate the worth of being reconciled to God not by being fine and full, but by their faith when they are bruised and empty.

On this first day of Lent I need to make a confession. I have never once in my life had a day at the end of which I was hungry. Not one. Even now, as I type the words of this reflection, there is a cup of tea and a banana to the right of me on my desk. Over one billion people in the world are hoping to survive this day in absolute poverty, but I have no experience of any kind by which I can measure what that feels like. I intend this Lent to be different.

The funeral of Myrtle Webber took place at St. Mary's on 17 October and was conducted by Rev'd Steph Gordon-Jeffs. Keep it up for a year if you can but if you miss one or two your record will still be useful to us. It doesn't matter



#### **STOODLEIGH**

A Reminder - Defibrillators

In an emergency situation where heart problems are suspected the first thing to do is ring 999 for help. We are fortunate to have two defibrillators in Stoodleigh, each located at either end of our village. One is on the left hand side as you enter the Parish Hall stone porch, and the other outside the Stoodleigh Inn on the wall near the entrance. Each red defibrillator case is housed inside a cabinet.

The Parish Hall cabinet opens with no code needed but the Inn cabinet requires a code. The code is C159X and is clearly written on the top of the cabinet. Once opened, grab the red defibrillator case AND the two clear plastic bags which contain useful items to help in an emergency situation, rush it to where it is needed, open it and follow the instructions, which are very clear. The defibrillator once activated, will talk you through the process. Yes, actually talk you through what to do!

The two clear plastic bags contain alcohol wipes to clean the chest skin, razors to shave hair from a chest (do this as calmly as you can if needed), and a towel to dry the skin thoroughly so that the adhesive pads of the defibrillator will stick to flesh. The pads need to stick firmly to the skin in order for the defibrillator to function correctly. Once the pads have been placed on the patient, the machine will assess if a shock is needed and guide the user through the process. Hopefully, whilst a first aider is doing this, more help will be on its way.

When finished with, please replace the defibrillator back into the cabinet and notify one of our Parish Councillors (see the Stoodleigh Website) that it has been used so that everything can be renewed and replaced ready for its next use.

It is indeed a marvellous first aid to have in our village, and it is worth taking a moment in your day to find out which defibrillator is nearest if you needed it. and to familiarise vourself with how to access it. The Parish Council have a weeklv rota checking that both defibrillator units are in good order and ready for use. And if you visit the Stoodleigh Village website, there is a section about the defibrillators, with pictures, to familiarize yourself with.

What3Words is another great tool for giving precise locations to emergency services. The App can be downloaded on a smartphone and it is effectively a map of the world, where every three metre square section is referenced by a unique combination of three words. For instance; tin.miracles.upsetting or overpaid.dabbled.tricks. This means that you can pinpoint an exact location, such as your house, using the designated three words. And here's a great tip... once you have got the What3Words for where you live, you can visit eBay and for a few pounds purchase a fridge magnet personalised with your What3Words. If you don't have a smartphone, What3Words can also be accessed on a web browser. Well worth having these three words written by your landline if you are housebound, or the App which will locate you on your mobile phone.




